Tennessee Regional Library System

- A division of the Tennessee State Library & Archives, Tennessee Department of State
- Created in 1939 to provide guidance and leadership in the development of public library service in Tennessee





The beginning...

- In 1933-34, only 16 counties in Tennessee provided public library service... through 25 libraries
- Two-thirds of the state's population were without library service
- Tennessee, and the country, was in the throes of the depression

The beginning.... With TVA



- The Tennessee Valley Authority started building their first dam (Norris) in 1933
- They saw the need for library service for their workers...as "aids to employee training and morale."

TVA Philosophy

- The most important factor of TVA library service was its flexibility.
- Libraries were non-traditional, planned to meet existing needs and to grow in whatever direction was needed

Watts Bar Dam, Fort Loudoun Region

 The slogan "Taking the Library to the Worker" developed from the TVA policy of making the opportunity to read convenient and easy.

1934

Mary Utopia Rothrock, former director at Lawson-McGhee Library in Knoxville, became lead librarian at TVA's Norris Dam project

 She had a vision of a regional library program...one she immediately put into practice



Rothrock quotes



- o "Wherever they live or work, the library follows."
- Rothrock had the hope of "making books available to all."
- She called schools, libraries, and bookstores "the appliances of mental growth."

Mary Utopia Rothrock



 She set up the first rural library in the model town TVA built for the workers that built Norris Dam


- Her next library was in Meigs County, near Watts Bar Dam
- She set up small libraries in post offices, stores and filling stations -- all over East Tennessee
- She won the 1938
 ALA Lippincott Award for her work in the TN Valley

1937



- The first Tennessee state law allowing the creation of regional libraries passed in 1937
- The law created a
 Division of Libraries
 within the State
 Department of
 Education

The first official region



- In 1939, four counties (surrounding Watts Bar Dam) came together to form the first region-Meigs, Rhea, Roane, Loudon
- First called Loudon County Region, later renamed the Fort Loudoun Region
- It was funded by TVA for 5 years

Slowly, but surely

- The second region started in 1941 and later became known as Nolichucky Region
- Similar growth started in West TN in 1941 -- later known as Reelfoot Region
- The first state funding began in 1943 -- \$20,000... to make up for the loss of TVA funding
- Growth spread rapidly across the state


The WPA provided aid

- In August 1941, the Works Progress Administration (WPA) provided the first bookmobile for the region
- Funding also included a driver, salary assistance for librarians in larger communities, and supplemental book money




The First Regional Bookmobile – serving a negro community in Knox County



Growth and changes

 By 1968 the system included 12 multi-county regions and 4 metropolitan regions, encompassing the entire state and all 95 counties



Organizational Changes

- Regional Program overseen by State Dept. of Education from 1937-1951
- Establishment of State Library & Archives Commission in 1951-52
- Moved to Dept. of State in 1982
- Contract agencies from 1937-1999
- Became official state agencies in July, 1999




